

# National Voter Education Week

October 7 - 11, 2024

Voters should have the information they need to cast their ballots with confidence. First, logistical information: find your polling location, understand your ballot, know early voting and vote-by-mail opportunities, and make a plan to vote.

Second, know the positions on the ballot and the candidates running for them. Research their positions and track record, considering multiple issues together and their positions on those issues, before deciding who to vote for.

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## Monday: Register to Vote or Check Your Registration Status

Registering to vote can take less than 10 minutes to complete. If you're already registered, make sure your information is as up to date as possible.

## Tuesday: Request your Mail-In Ballot

If you are unable to vote at your designated polling place, request your absentee ballot. Understand local vote-by-mail procedures in your area.

## Wednesday: Make a Plan to Vote

Whether you want to vote in-person early or on Election Day, or if you need to request a mail-in ballot, take the steps today to be prepared to vote when the time comes.

## Thursday: Learn Your Ballot

Know where your candidates stand on issues that matter to you. Review your ballot for new laws and policies, and educate yourself on ballot initiatives and constitutional amendments at all levels of government.

#### Friday: Mobilize Your Community

Volunteer as a poll worker or to help others register to vote.
